



## PUPIL PREMIUM STATEMENT

Beacon Academy aims to provide opportunities for its students that enable them to play an active role in the twenty-first century. As a fully inclusive academy, students have full access to and experience of the curriculum regardless of race, class, gender, physical ability and religious belief. The Academy promotes a sense of self-esteem, responsibility and tolerance in young people. It values and challenges the individual so that they achieve the highest levels of attainment whatever their starting point.

The Pupil Premium is therefore a key resource for ensuring the realisation of this inclusive and aspirational ethos. The nature of the issue makes it essential that personalised rather than blanket support is provided for students. We recognise that not all students who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged or underachieving. We also recognise that not all students who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. We therefore reserve the right to extend support for non-Pupil Premium students to provide access to additional intervention(s) to support any groups of pupils the academy has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged.

The Pupil Premium Grant is paid to schools for students who are: recorded as being eligible for Free School Meals in the last 6 years, who are Looked After or who have a parent serving in the armed forces.

**The impact of the Pupil Premium funding – 2016/2017**

**Statistical significance:** it should be noted that 75% of the summer 2017 cohort (cohort size 28) were eligible for the Pupil Premium; the number of non-pupil premium students was less than 7 and could be judged not statistically relevance due to the small cohort size.

**Progress 8**

In the summer 2017 outcomes the **pupil premium cohort achieved a Progress 8 score of +0.30**. The pupil premium cohort achieved a higher progress 8 score than the **non-pupil premium cohort who achieved +0.23**.

**Attainment 8**

The **pupil premium funding has supported those students eligible, to achieve an attainment 8 score of 37.93**. Although the **non-pupil premium cohort (54.54)** achieved in excess of the pupil premium cohort, the non-pupil premium cohort size for this measure was 5.

**Basics Measure**

Of the 21 students eligible for the pupil premium, 12 achieved the Basics measure (9-4 in both English and maths) 57.14%. 7 Students 33.33% achieved 9-5 in both English and maths. 1 student (4.76%) achieved a 9-7 in both English and maths.

71.43% (5 students) of the non-pupil premium cohort achieved 9-5 in both English and maths. 42.86% (3 students) of the non-pupil premium cohort achieved a 9-7 in both English and maths. It should be noted that the cohort size for the non-pupil premium cohort was 7.

The overall Progress 8 score for the Pupil Premium cohort in the Open Subjects was +1.61, this was a stronger performance than the Non-Pupil Premium cohort who achieved +1.21. the performance of the Pupil Premium cohort was also 0.22 stronger than the non Pupil-Premium cohort in the EBacc subjects

For historical comparison purposes: 100% of the students eligible for pupil premium funding have made expected (3 levels) progress or better in the following subjects:

- Business Studies
- Health & Social Care
- ICT
- Music

- Performing Arts
- Sports Studies

For historical comparison purposes, in the following subjects, a significant number of students eligible for the pupil premium made better than expected progress:

- Business Studies: 45% of the pupil premium cohort made better than expected (at least 4 levels) progress
- Engineering: 31% of the pupil premium cohort made better than expected progress.
- Health & Social Care: 43% of the pupil premium cohort made better than expected progress
- ICT: 95% of the pupil premium cohort made better than expected progress.
- Music: 100% of the pupil premium cohort made better than expected progress.
- Performing Arts: 50% of the pupil premium cohort made better than expected progress
- Photography: 33% of the pupil premium cohort made better than expected progress
- Sport studies: 86% of the pupil premium cohort made better than expected progress.

**Pupil Premium Funds for 2016-17 were allocated as follows and students received the individual support appropriate to meet their needs:**

- 1:1 tuition in numeracy and literacy in Key Stage 3 and 4
- Small group support across a wide range of subjects including English, Maths, Science at Key Stages 3 and 4
- Additional hours for teaching assistants over and above the statutory hours to support students with a statement for D-SEN
- Intensive individual mentoring and support from internal and external sources including peer-mentoring: this to include more regular and detailed feedback on progress, short term target setting leading to greater independence in learning, motivation and progress
- Small withdrawal groups for selected students in Key Stage 3 and 4
- Alternative courses and qualifications to GCSEs taught in small groups
- Financial support to ensure equal opportunities to make progress, the provision of revision and other non-essential (but desirable) learning materials and activities (such as visits, leavers' events) that may not be accessible to some students due to cost.

**To ensure value for money and support we have allocated staff time to:**

- Track the prior attainment, current attainment and future predicted attainment of these students
- Track and support good attendance
- Additional careers advice to raise aspirations, motivation and attainment and reduce the chance of NEET
- Provide extra support and guidance where needed at key transition points in students' school career, i.e. between Years 6 and 7; between Years 9 and 10.
- Specifically identify the progress of these students and where it is less than good ensure that home contact is made, families are aware of the support available and that relevant support and interventions are in place (from the above list) to support improved progress in future. In addition to personally make contact and remind families of important events such as parents evenings, information evenings, exams and revision, deadline for work experience etc.

**The success criteria for this group of students are as follows:**

- Attainment and attendance rates at Beacon Academy to continue to improve further and exceed national averages
- Parental engagement further developed through good communication and student progress to improve as a result of this impact
- Participation in school extra-curricular activities, clubs, trips, to increase further
- Retention at Post-16 to further improve
- Exclusion rates of this group to be below the school average

Between 2015/16, 2016/17; the academy received £935 for each student eligible for the pupil premium.
